History of the Parma Schools

(continued)

Formal schools as we know them today, did not begin in Parma Township until 1826. Prior to that time, children were educated at home by their parents. The early settlers in the township came from Connecticut, New York State, Massachusetts, and Vermont to settle here in the New Connecticut 'Western Reserve'. The first settler in Range 13, was Benajah Fay and his family in 1816. Settlement had been slow here until 1821 and the local population grew. The area was called 'Greenbrier' before Parma township was organized in 1826.

In 1825, Samuel Freeman and his wife with their ten children arrived in Parma Township from Massachusetts. The Freeman family lived in the newly constructed barn at B. Fay's Inn while their two story house was built along Wooster Pike (now Pearl Road). Mr. Freeman was the first school teacher in Parma Township. Later, his son, Lyndon, became a school teacher in the township also. Mr. Freeman later became the first Justice of The Peace and Post master in Parma Twp. The first meeting of the Parma Township Trustees was held in the Freeman home in early April, 1826.

On May 26, 1826, the first early school district boundaries were established by the first elected Township Trustees. The first school classes were held in Mr. Freeman's house. Later that year, a log school house was built along Wooster Pike in a Northern portion of the Parma Township Cemetery (now Parma Heights Cemetery). In 1913, a metal marker was dedicated on that land parcel indicates the early school building site that stood until 1841. Inside this public Township building, meetings, local elections, a singing school and religious services as well as learning took place. Two school sub-districts were established in 1826. The first sub-district school was established at Wooster Pike and Snow Road. The second sub-district school was established on Townline Road (now Broadview Rd near Rockside Rd).

The number of sub-district schools grew with the increase of the school age population over time and more teachers were hired to teach the local children. In 1843, the following list of early teachers were working in the township: Julia A. Beals, Emily T. Gillett, Abigail H. Andress, William Wheeler, S. W. Haladay, Charles H. Babcock and Caroline Humphrey. In 1851, list of early teachers employed were: O.O. Spafford, L.R. Thorp, S.W. Chandler, Frances C. Eaton, Eliza Storer, Frances Huntingon, and William Taylor. Prior to the adoption of the new 1851 State of Ohio Constitution, each school district was independent and operated their schools to suit themselves. After the new state constitution became law, each school district had a Board Of Education, consisting of clerks from each sub-district elected by the local residents.

Each sub-district one room school had one teacher assigned to it to teach all eight grades Each school varied in design, size, and building materials used at the time of construction. Each school was indicated on the township map. Each sub-district school was assigned a number and the land parcel was recorded as being owned by the Board of Education. Each sub-district elected three persons to be in charge of the local school house. A Clerk for a three year term; Two Directors, one for a one year term and another for two years. This was the time period when there was local control of the school house and the taught core curriculum. There were nine sub-district school houses in existence in 1853.

As early as 1853, parts of the school district were attached to fractional parts of other school districts such as Brooklyn, Brecksville, Independence, and North Royalton. Thus, adding confusion for later historians who read the old records. Teachers worked for low wages and in schoolhouses with limited teaching aids. *(to be continued)*

5 Tips For Collecting Money For Your Class Reunion

Whether you are planning a class reunion or a family reunion, one of the biggest obstacles to overcome is how to get people to purchase tickets for the event.

Planning a reunion is hard enough, but when you don't know how many people to expect, it is next to impossible. It is very important to know well in advance how many people are coming to the reunion events you are planning. Encourage people to spread the word about the reunion website and update their profiles so people can connect before the big event.

2. Guarantee your guests that if the reunion ends up getting cancelled they will get a refund. This is another concern that many people have, so if you alleviate this worry, you remove another excuse they may have not to pay for their ticket.

3. Come up with some incentives for people to commit early to the reunion. Offer people an early bird special, and discount the price for people who purchase their tickets by a certain date.

4. Offer people who buy tickets by a certain date a chance at entering a draw to win a prize if they buy their tickets by a certain date. The prize can be a free ticket to the event or a gift that you are able to get for free from a member of the committee.

5. Give people several options to pay for a ticket. That means allowing people to send a check by mail, pay cash in person or pay with a credit card on your class reunion website or family reunion website. Paying by credit card is much easier than writing a check, so if you only accept checks you give people another reason to procrastinate and put off making a decision about coming to the reunion or not.

Social media has made it easier than ever to find people. But PLEASE do not only use one of them. Not everyone does Facebook or Twitter and it is not fair to exclude them just because they don't!
